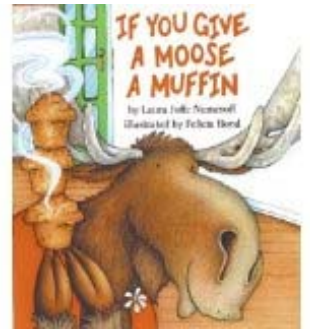
In Science, we are studying trees and examined the evergreen trees and the big maple trees on our playground!

Kids Who Code

Local schools join mission to introduce 100 million students to computer science

Computers are everywhere, but fewer schools teach computer science than 10 years ago. A limited number of students have experience with computer coding. The good news is, we're on our way to changing this.

In basic terms, coding is "giving computers directions". The **Hour of Code** is a learning event designed to spark global interest in computer science and programming. In one week last year, 15 million students tried computer science as a part of the Hour of Code. This year, the goal is to reach 100 million students.

Students at two local schools are teaming up to host their own coding event, the Kids Who Code Code-a-thon! The **Kids Who Code Code-a-thon** is a student-led coding event being held on December 12th, during this year's Hour of Code celebration week. Students from Mrs. Obach's Grade 2 class at Hamiota Elementary School are learning about computer science using a variety of kid-friendly coding tools in preparation for teaching others how to code during the Code-a-thon. The event will be co-hosted with Mrs. Caldwell's Kindergarten class at Oak Lake Community School. Teachers, students, pre-service teachers and community guests will have the opportunity to learn about coding and computer science.

The Hour of Code, organized by the nonprofit Code.org and over 100 other partners, is a statement that today's generation of students are ready to learn critical skills for 21st century success. 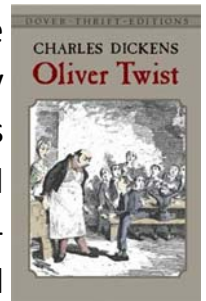

Of our Middle Years students there were 23 of 26 girls playing volleyball and 17 of 24 boys playing.

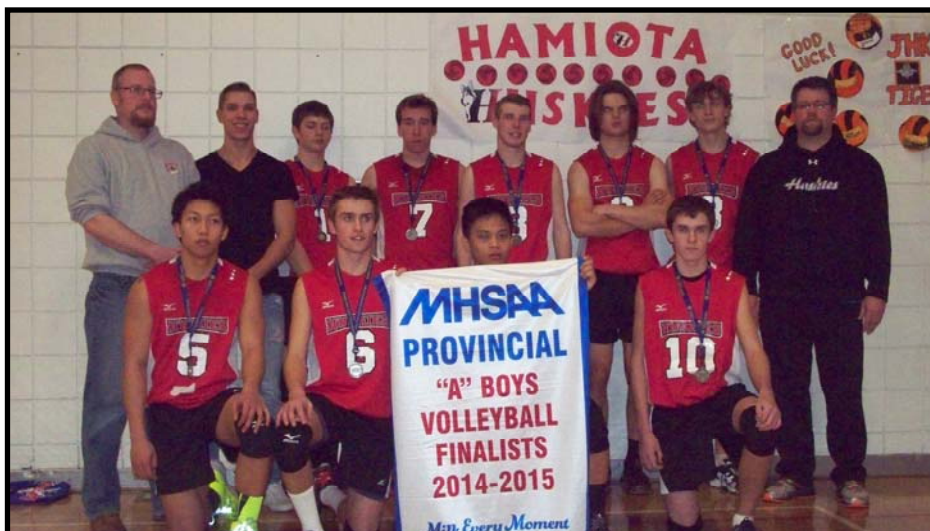
VARSITY VOLLEYBALL SEASON WRAP-UP

BOYS

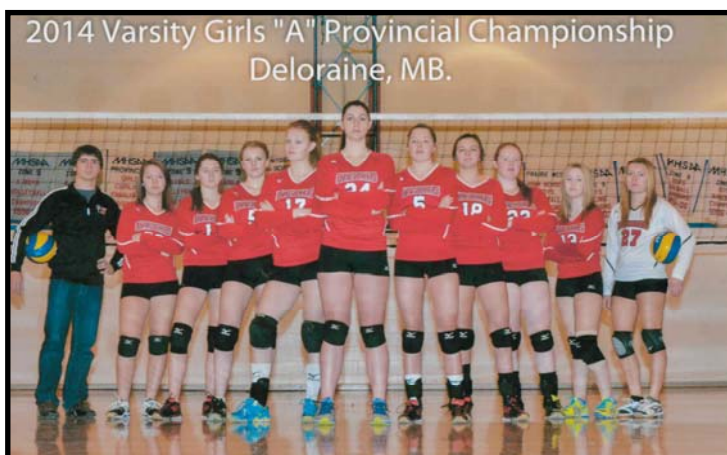
The Varsity Boys saw their season come to an end Saturday, November 29th with a loss to the Rosenort in the Boys "A" Provincial finals. The boys went the entire round robin without losing a set. After losing their first set to Snow Lake in the quarter finals the boys came out gunning in the second set to win 25-10. In the third set, led by Jorden Leronowich serving 15 in a row, the Huskies won by an incredible score of 15-0.

The Huskies then went on to beat Elm Creek in the semi-

finals 25-22 and 25-11 to move on to the provincial finals. The boys went on to lose the finals in three sets to Rosenort by the scores of 25-20, 18-25, and losing in a close third set 15-13. This was the boys' second trip to the provincial finals in two years, with Jun Jun Taborlupa and Sawyer Norrie receiving all-star awards. Even though the boys ended their season with a loss, they had an incredible overall season with a record of 101 sets won to 17 sets lost. They boys would like to thank all the parents and community members who have supported them over the years and watched them play.
