Principal's Message



Returning to school after the Christmas break is always an exciting time with staff and students rested and re-energized to tackle the remainder of the school year. January has been a very busy month at both schools but at HCI it is often described as exam month! The grade 12 students have been busy writing their Provincial ELA and Math exams and I am proud of their efforts. The remainder of the students at HCI will write their exams during the week of January 29 to February 2. Please check the schedule on the school website for the dates of each exam. At the elementary school staff and students have once again found their groove and are making great strides in their learning. It is such a joy to see all of the great things that are happening at both schools.

On January 9, Constable Gord Olson from the Internet Child Exploitation Unit (ICE) of the RCMP visited our school and gave a terrific presentation to all of the students during the day. He was able to inform and enlighten our students as how to stay safe when online. Constable Olson graciously stayed around Hamiota and gave the same presentation to interested parents and community members in the evening.

On the extracurricular front the students have been very busy. Basketball is in full swing with the middle year's teams joining our varsity boys' and girls' basketball teams with a full schedule of play. It is nice to see the varsity boys' team back in action at Hamiota Collegiate. January and February seem to be the months for curling at our schools as well. The grade 5 and 6 curling teams will travel to Miniota on January 24 to curl in a PWSD bonspiel and the grade 7 & 8 students will travel to Binscarth on February 13 to curl. The varsity curling teams are gearing up for zone play downs on February 8. High School Hockey continues to roll along with the boys team sitting tied for second in the WSHL with a 16-2-1 record. Rehearsals for the major drama production, The Addams Family, are in full swing with students and staff meeting on Sunday afternoons to practice.

GRADE 1 NEWS from Mrs. Nowosad

It is hard to believe we are half way through January already. Time is flying, and we have been very busy getting back into routine in grade 1. I want to take this chance to thank all my amazing students and families for the lovely gifts I received at Christmas time. Thank you!

Our guided reading groups are back up and running and it's nice to see the progress students are making. We continue to work hard on using different strategies to help when we get stuck on unknown words. We have started an in school and take home fluency project where students have an opportunity to read a passage multiple times to build fluency, expression and confidence. I am really pleased with how this is working. We have been doing some writing about our five senses in ELA and Science. Our next writing project will be done in partners, writing about what would make the best pet. The exciting part is they get to incorporate two animals into one new pet. (Eg: a girafocat is half giraffe and half cat. Both animals bring something unique.)

In math, we have been working with base ten blocks, using these to identify and build numbers to 100. We continue to work at representing numbers in a variety of ways. We are also working on addition facts, starting with adding 0, then 1 and now adding 2. Skip counting by 2, 5 and ten is getting easier each day!! We will be starting to use Zorbit Math on the iPads very soon.

In Science we are working on the Five Sense Unit. We have done some writing and poster making as well as identifying different ways things feel to the touch. We have used our sense of taste to identify our favourite kinds of chips :)

Thank you to all our families and friends for the generous donations we were able to collect for the local food bank and Christmas Cheer. This tremendous support just goes to show what a great community we live in!

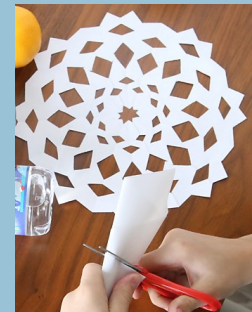
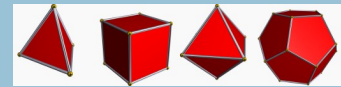
We are working with polygons and 3 dimensional solids in Math. It's interesting to see all the shapes that exist in our world!

Though many of us would like to see more snow, we're certainly enjoying the January sunshine and the mild days are a bonus for outdoor recesses!



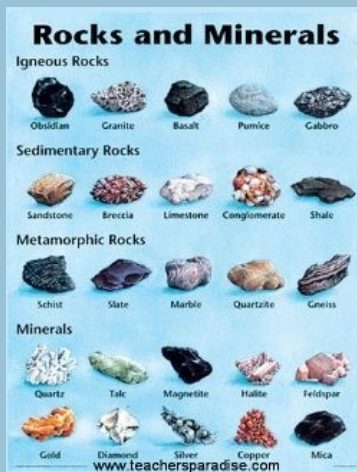
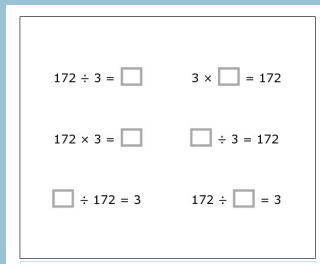
GRADE 4 NEWS from Mrs. L. Routledge

Welcome back! I hope each and every one of my students and their families had a restful and relaxing Christmas break! It has been a hard couple of months with the rotten bugs going around. Hopefully the New Year brings some good health and energy for all!

The Grade 4 kids came back from break raring to go! We started off January using our BIG imaginations to write a piece entitled, "If I were trapped in a snow globe..." What a wild bunch! These are creatively displayed in our hallway. Come on in and let us entertain you!

In math, we continue to use our strategies for solving multiplication equations. So far we can use arrays, doubling, skip counting, and the break-apart strategy to solve more challenging facts. We are busy practising our facts at school as well, using flash cards to help us recall them in 3 seconds or less. I've encouraged the students to practise at home for a few minutes each night as well.

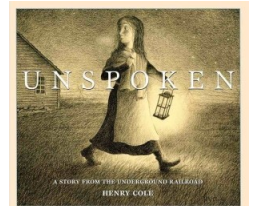
Rocks and Minerals are all the rage in Grade 4 science. We are learning all about the 3 types of rocks and how they are made! Some of our vocabulary words include; weathering, sediments, magma, mantle, and igneous.



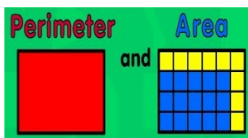
GRADE 5 NEWS from Mrs. D. Routledge

January...as a teacher this is absolutely my favourite teaching month! It always seems like we get so much done in January because there are fewer "other" things going on. Kids also come back from their break ready to learn. Unfortunately, the 'bugs' in the air this year are certainly taking their toll on the students in this class. Hopefully everyone will soon be feeling better, and we can have a day when everyone is here.

In LA we have been working with a wordless picture book called Unspoken by Henry Cole which deals with the Underground Railroad. We started the month by doing some research on slavery and talking about how unfairly African Americans were treated. Doing this research led us into learning little bits about Harriet Tubman, the civil war, Quakers, and of course, the underground railroad itself. The students are using bits of the knowledge they have gained to write a story to go with the pictures in the book Unspoken. They are including adjectives, adverbs, similes and some dialogue in their story.



We are also doing 'Contract Reading'. For this, students are given a choice of three books at their reading level to complete within a month's time. They have to set a date prior to starting. Once their book is done they are to complete one assignment based on their genre. For example, those reading a nonfiction book have a different choice of assignments than those reading an autobiography or an adventure. These books can be read at school and at home, but must be completed on time.



We are working on a Measurement unit in math. At this point we are struggling to sort out the difference between area and perimeter. There is a lot of new vocabulary in this unit which can be difficult for some students. I would like to encourage parents to continue to practice multiplication facts with their child. Being solid with their facts makes finding all possible rectangles with an area of 36, for example, much easier.

In science we are working on a unit called Properties of And Changes in Substances. This means we are learning about solids, liquids, and gases and how they can change through physical or chemical changes. We are doing lots of hands on experiments which is always the fun part.

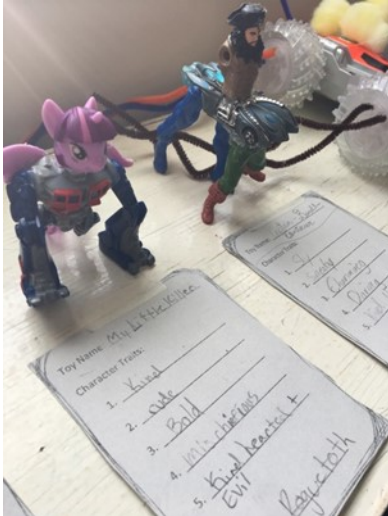

GRADE 5 NEWS from Miss Schettler



Happy New Year! This month in ELA we have been learning about character traits. Everyone completed mobiles and word splash art to showcase their personal character traits. Next we created characters by taking apart old toys and hot gluing new arms, legs and heads on them! The students then picked



5 character traits for their toys. We are now starting to plan and write a story about the toys coming alive at night. I wonder what the toys will get up to....

Math has been full of division this month as we learnt 2 ways of doing long division with 3 digit numbers. The students have also been practicing 2 digit by 2 digit multiplication with the strategy they like best. We are about to finish up multiplication and division with our test on Jan 30th.

In science we have started a unit on Substances. We have been exploring characteristics of substances and how water changes states. Soon we will be looking into physical and chemical changes. The students have been enjoying using the measuring scales and playing with oobleck.

The Huskies continue to have a great season. With players from Hamiota, Shoal Lake, Strathclair, Birtle and Rossburn, the team is currently in second place in the West Division behind Vincent Massey with a 16-2-1 record. They look forward to the rest of the league and the playoffs.

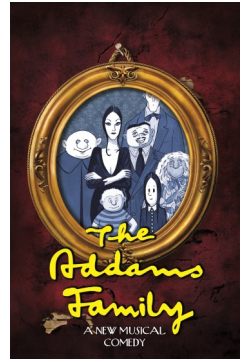
The girls team travelled to Neepawa on January 21st to compete in a junior bonspiel. The girls had a great day of curling and placed third out of six teams.

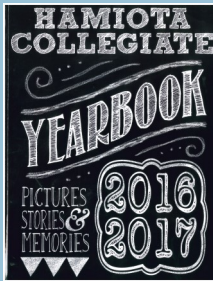

- Cell phones or other electronic devices are strictly prohibited in the exam room and will be confiscated if found. These forms of electronic media can be used to cheat and could result in a student being disqualified from writing an exam.
- Grade 6, 7, & 8 Students will attend classes as regularly scheduled.
- Grade 9-12 students may go home each day after their exam is completed or may stay at school and study in the library.
- If a student leaves school they are not to come back at the end of the day to ride the bus. (exception for noon hour)
- The computer lab will be closed to students during the exam week unless specific arrangements are made by teachers.
