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KINDERGARTEN NEWS from Ms. Surovy



It's hard to believe that we are already almost halfway through the school year! We have had a busy January, getting back into routine after Christmas break. Beginning next week, our Kindergarten students will be coming to school full time! I know that many of our students are just as excited as I am for full time Kindergarten, as we have been counting down during our Calendar time to see "how many days we have until we get to come to Kindergarten every day!"

We have now learned 17 letters of the alphabet! Each week we learn about a new letter, practicing how to print the letter and identifying the sound that it makes. This month we learned about letters X, W, Y, and Z. Once we begin full time Kindergarten we will also begin exploring our Literacy Centres twice a week, and as we complete all of the letters in our Alpha-Bags we will transition into our Home Reading Program. We have also been busy writing in our journals and in the coming weeks we will begin studying our Kindergarten sight words.



In math, we have been having lots of fun working through our math centre activities. We have continued to work on counting, subitizing, recognizing and tracing numerals, and creating patterns. We have also started working on representing numerals in several different ways and creating different sets to represent numbers. These are skills that we will continue to work on in the coming months.

Beginning in December, our class has also been learning all about the Zones of Regulation, a program that helps students learn about self-regulation and emotional control. We have had lots of fun exploring the four zones of regulation and learning about some of the characters from Disney's "Inside Out" in the process! This month we have also focused on learning about courage. Students have enjoyed learning about and practicing the different ways we can demonstrate courage and identifying characters that use courage during our story time. Next month we will be focusing on honesty as our character trait of the month.

Students are becoming much more confident at using a variety of different strategies to help themselves and they know the importance of making the text make sense when they are reading. We are working to develop more details in our writing, and becoming more confident in using our dictionaries when we are unsure how to spell a word. Our last writing activity involved using our imaginations to decide what we would do if we could plan our own snow day activities. There would be lots of movies watched, hot chocolate made and games played.

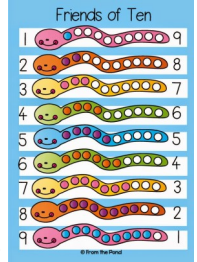


Now we are wishing for a snow day!!

In Math, we continue to work on different addition strategies. We are getting really good at our Friends of 10 facts as well as adding one or two to a given number.

We are working on solving and creating word problems. We have been practicing making numbers with base 10 blocks. We have started to make good use of our vertical, non permanent learning surfaces in math. It has been fun to be able to use these while working with a partner.

In Science, we have been practicing the days of the week, months of the year and seasons. We have learned which holidays fall in each month as well as listened to some fun songs on you tube.



Thank you to Brielle and her mom for bringing in two baby goats and a lamb for a visit last week. They were very cute and such a neat opportunity for us all.

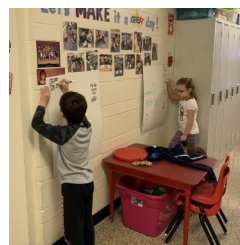
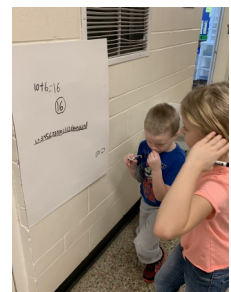
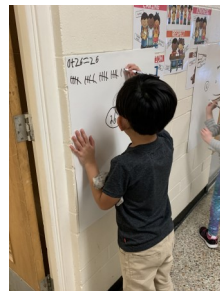


Baby Harlyn and her mom made another visit to our room last week. It was amazing to see how much she has grown since we saw her last (in November).

100th Day of School

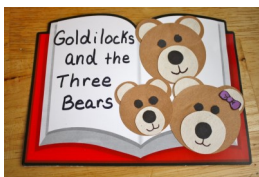


Working on vertical whiteboards.

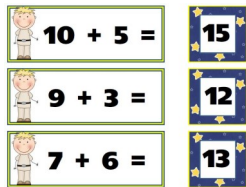
GRADE 2 NEWS from Mrs. McNabb & Mrs. Gregory



January always brings a new opportunity to refresh old routines and to set new goals. The first week back to school, they learned about New Years Resolutions and set new learning, home, and personal goals for 2019. In partners, they conducted personal interviews about themselves....."NEW YEAR, NEW YOU." They are learning about procedural writing and have been working on "steps to build a snowman." This class LOVES to write!



We have been working on fairy tales. Each reading group has been practicing a traditional tale to act out as a readers theatre. During our shared reading time, we read a humorous tale of Goldie Locks and The Three Bears.....a twist on the familiar version we all know and love. Our 5 finger retelling strategy is helping us to practice our retelling skills. The students are comparing and contrasting these 2 stories using a Venn diagram and have created individual story maps. These are all important comprehension skills that help us to become stronger readers, as good readers have to understand what they are reading.



In math the grade 2 students have been working on using efficient strategies to add and subtract numbers up to 18. They have been also been learning about how the order of adding three or four numbers does not change the sum as well as how a certain order can make adding the numbers easier. The students have been showing various numbers in many different ways including ten frames, tallies, money and number sentences to name a few. They have worked on ordering and comparing numbers up to one hundred. They have also been working on place value skills and discovering different ways to show a given number using tens and ones.



In science the grade 2 class has been working on the different states of matter. They used Fruit Loops to show how the atoms in solids, liquids, and gases are different. They completed an experiment to discover if given items floated or sank. The students also made boats out of tinfoil and completed an experiment to see if their tinfoil boats, a Styrofoam tray or a strainer would hold more pennies. The results showed that the Styrofoam trays easily held all the pennies but many were surprised at how many pennies the tinfoil boats were able to hold. They also constructed boats out of clay, tested them and redesigned them until they floated and held weight. We also had a boat building challenge where the students were asked to build a boat out of any materials they brought from home. They also tested them to see if they would float and hold weight. We had many creative boats and they all successfully floated and held some pennies. Our boats are on display in the hallway, so check them out if you are in the school!



GRADE THREE NEWS FROM Mrs. Dixon

Welcome to 2019! It's been a busy start to the new year. We've been learning about icebergs and that led to lots of reading and conversations about the sinking of the Titanic. Our class has been very interested in this tragic story and we've become quite the experts on the facts of the Titanic!



We're also reading and writing about some interesting stories of Canada's great sport - hockey! Our home reading program has been the annual Grade 3 Reading Hockey Tournament and there is very close competition going on!

In Math, we're learning about polygons and 3 dimensional shapes. They are everywhere in our world!



During our January Lilac visit, we talked with our buddies about their winter memories and we made Venn diagrams comparing our experiences with theirs. Riding to school in behind a horse

GRADE FOUR NEWS from Mrs. L. Routledge



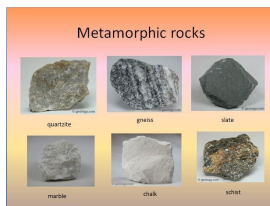
Brrrrrrrrr....bundle up because the Arctic winds are blowing down from the north. It may be cold outside, but we are working up a sweat in Grade 4! Our hallway is adorned with winter art galore so pop down and have a look next time you are in the school.



Guided Reading is back in full swing with our fictional selections ranging from tall tales to written “raps”. Our writing journal selection this month was a narrative piece entitled, “If I were trapped in a snow globe...” The students used imagination and creativity to set the scene for stories involving adventure, fantasy, mythical creatures, magic and heroism.



In math, we are busy memorizing our multiplication facts! Our goal is to collect a “paper scoop” of ice-cream for each set of facts we learn. If we’ve learned all the facts by the end of March, we will have an ice-cream party to celebrate, with all the tasty toppings! Keep practicing those flashcards at home too! It really does help reinforce what we are doing at school. Coming soon....DIVISION!



We are wrapping up our science unit on rocks and minerals, with an exciting experiment! We are scientists demonstrating how to make METAMORPHIC rock....with plasticine! And what fun we had...squishing and squashing and flattening our rocks and minerals using extreme pressure(our body weight and a heavy book) and intense heat(our hands).

GRADE FIVE NEWS from Mrs. D. Routledge

Wow! It's hard to believe January is almost behind us! It has been a busy month in the classroom, as we have worked our way through a variety of topics.

In math we are working on a measurement unit where we are learning about area, perimeter, volume, and capacity. Sometimes it's hard to remember which is which, and then trying to remember whether it's centimetres, square centimetres or cubic centimetres makes it even trickier! We have also built a cubic metre and were surprised by how big it was.



We have been working on guided reading in language arts, and as a whole the class has read a variety of books in a variety of genres. As they read, they are guided through the process with a handout that is to be used when not working directly with Mrs. Routledge. We also continue to work on writer's workshop to further develop our writing skills.



We have also been studying Properties of And Changes in Matter in science. In this unit we have done many hands on experiments which

showed both physical and chemical changes, as well as reversible and non-reversible changes. Of course, the ones that involve baking soda and vinegar are always the favourites!

In French we have been working in a variety of stations in small groups. One station is putting words in the correct order to create proper sentences from our play. Another activity is the game Memory where we match opposites. We also have a center where we record ourselves reading our play. There is also a station where we read simple French stories and then write in English what they are about to show we understand what we read. There is also a station where we talk with Mrs. Routledge. She asks us questions (in French!) about our play, and then asks us other things she wants us to know like the days of the week, months of the year, the date, how to say we like something, or don't like something! And finally, there are a few stations where we work on the written component of our French play.

Besides all of this, we had the opportunity to go to Brandon to watch a BU girls basketball game as a reward for being peer mentors. Thanks Mr. C. for organizing this for us!
