



GRADE ONE 'O' NEWS

Grade 1 Newsletter

Do you know how many days we have been at school? We have been at school for over 149 days!

We have a student teacher named Miss Dyck in our class.

Together we made a goal of working towards 400 PAX minutes a week. PAX is about peace, being good, and happiness.

We have been learning about geometry. Geometry is about 3-D objects and 2-D shapes. To practice shapes we use popsicle sticks and tangrams.

We've had a busy month in science. For Earth Day we had Oak Lake Kinders come and visit our school. We learned about beavers and water from Oak Hammock Marsh presenters.

GRADE 2 NEWS



Everyone came back from spring break refreshed and ready to work hard for the final term. The grade 2 class has continued to work hard on improving their reading and writing skills. Our mini theme this month has been pioneers. We have been reading some Little House on the Prairie books and doing a variety of reading and writing activities.

We continue to work hard on our cursive writing and have learned many of the lower case letters. We have also finished learning all of our Words of the Week and are now brushing up on some of the more difficult ones.

During the past month we have been working hard on learning various subtraction strategies. We are also learning strategies to help us add two digit numbers up to 100. We have been using a variety of units such as paper clips, Popsicle sticks, straws, toothpicks and snap cubes to measure with. We have learned to measure straight objects, objects that are not straight and the distance around objects using a single unit or multiple copies. We

have also been using balance scales to determine the mass of different objects.

In social studies we are also studying pioneers. We have looked at pictures, read pioneer diaries and completed a chart to compare how things were

long ago and today. During our spare time we are having fun weaving on our looms. Our goal is to make 15 patches so everyone can take one home.

We have had some interesting special events during the month of April. We were amazed by the excellent singing and dancing of all the people in the Mecca choir.

For our Earth Day celebration we participated in the one hour without power activity. We also enjoyed the presentation from Oak Hammock Marsh. We learned many interesting facts about beavers. Our Celebration of Learning was well attended and everyone did a great job showing their work to their parents.

It is hard to believe there are only two more months of school left! We are looking forward to some warm spring weather so we can finally get rid of rubber boots, mitts and hats!




GRADE THREE NEWS

It's business as usual for the Grade 4 students! We have been busy, busy, busy in all subject areas.

In ELA, we are learning about and researching the mysterious world of Bigfoot. We have read two stories about real-life Bigfoot encounters; Roger Patterson and Albert Ostman. In Science we are learning about Habitats and Communities. In particular we have explored the beaver and its natural habitat in Canada. On earth day, we had a fellow from Oak Hammock Marsh come and speak to our class about the beaver and its habitat.




Thanks to Mrs. Obach for organizing this great presentation! The students were able to answer ALL of his questions and share their knowledge as well.
