Our learning focus is learning about the




parts of trees and how they change during the 4 seasons. We wrote a class BIG BOOK entitled, "Parts of A Tree," using real photos for the illustrations. At our playdough center, we brought nature into our classroom using pinecones and twigs, along with chocolate playdough and silk leaves.

Alpha-bags go home every night for homework. The students take home a letter bag with letter books to read and a writing book where they draw and label a picture. After each child has taken 26 letter bags home, we will have 26 new abc books to add to our "Book Nook" written



and illustrated by the kinder kids!

In math, we are playing many math games that focus on the counting principles: matching the count with our finger and counting objects to equal numbers up to 10. We are also becoming quick at subitizing dot patterns and power of 10 cards! Subitizing is where we recognize number patterns without having to count.



Dice games are a fun way to strengthen this skill!

At playtime, we are excited to take turns using the netbooks. Literactive.com is the site we are exploring, where we are listening to nursery rhymes and playing games to accompany each rhyme. Our new office in the construction area is busy taking building orders for new structures and various building supplies.

We were very lucky to have Michelle Bell, a grade 10 student from HCI, job shadow in our class for a day. Miss Bell was a welcome addition to our classroom! We hope that she will come back again sometime!



Now we are busy preparing for our first Christmas Concert! Until then, enjoy this festive season and all the fun and joy it brings!

At Hamiota Elementary School, we are trying to change that by introducing students to computer coding.

That's why we are joining in on the largest learning event in history: The Hour of Code! The **Hour of Code** is a learning event designed to spark global interest in computer science and programming. Hour of Code takes place during Computer Science Education Week (December 7-13th). More than 100 million students worldwide have already tried an Hour of Code and we are excited to see that number grow.

The Grade 1s at Hamiota Elementary School are very excited to participate in Hour of Code as we host our 2015 *Kids Who Code Code-a-thon!* This exciting, student-led event will take place on **Friday, December 11, from 10:00AM to 2:00PM at Hamiota Elementary School.** Our intention is that this event will encourage people to try coding. We are looking forward to the Code-a-thon very much!

HES Coding Club is off to a great start as well. A group of over 60 grades 2-5 students meet every Wednesday at noon to explore coding together. The Coding Club is currently coding using a tool called Scratch Jr. which is an app available as a free download for iPads. As we build our skills, we are hoping to try out other coding tools, robotics and more!



We were pleased to have Michelle Bell, from Grade 10, spend a day with us, as part of the job shadowing program. Thanks for all your help, Michelle!


The Christmas season is sneaking up very quickly. Where did the fall go? There will be much excitement in the school and the community next month!



GRADE FOUR NEWS by Mrs. Routledge

It's almost..."The Most Wonderful Time of the Year....!" But, first let us reflect on the month of November!

ELA – In ELA, we have wrapped up our term 1 Guided Reading and have just finished learning all about organizing our writing to write a retelling of the story *Hansel & Gretel*. We used graphic organizers to get us started and discussed story elements such as; setting, characters, problems, story events, and how the problem was solved. Students brainstormed descriptive words and phrases to add to the retellings to make our stories more interesting. This week, we have finished ALL language arts corrections and will be starting our mini unit, *Oliver Twist*. *Oliver Twist* will take us to the end of December and will be completed before Christmas holidays. Please ask your child to tell you about Oliver and the challenges he faced in the "olden days".



Math – We are well into our second unit – Multiplication and Division. So far we have explored the strategies; doubling, skip counting, and using smaller facts to help us solve larger facts. The students are working toward filling their paper cone with "scoops" of ice cream! When the cone is full, your child should be recalling multiplication facts in 5 seconds or less. We hope to have an ice cream party some time during the year when we all have our facts memorized! Your child will be bringing home practice sheets each week to support their recall of facts, that we are working on daily in math!

Science – Rocks and Minerals is our current topic of study in Science! We have a great song we listen too to get us pumped up for Science! Ask your child to find it on Youtube for you to listen to. We are learning the differences between rocks and minerals and just finished mining our very own "rock cookie". We found tons of tasty "minerals" in our rock cookie!

ROOTS OF EMPATHY by Mrs. Huberdeau

Mrs. Lindsay Routledge's Grade 4 Class at Hamiota Elementary School has been participating in the Roots of Empathy program with the help of "instructor" Baby Amelia Thompson, her mom Rebecca, and teacher Tana Huberdeau.

Our first theme was, "Meeting the Baby." Students were very excited to welcome Baby Amelia and learn about the different temperament traits that people have. We learned that every baby develops at a different pace, and that like babies, we have individual differences in our own personalities that should be celebrated. We talked about brain development and the billions of neurons that are at work in each baby's brain. We learned that love can be shown many ways and is a key ingredient in healthy development and secure attachment. Love grows brains!



October's theme was, "Crying." We enjoyed another visit with Baby Amelia and her mom, performed the "Welcome Song" and even recorded some lullabies for Mrs. Thompson to play for Amelia. We discussed that babies cry when they are trying to communicate a need that isn't being met. We also know that sometimes, babies cry even when all of their needs are met, and that it is important as

caregivers to never shake a baby. The Grade Fours learned strategies for soothing a baby and how to deal with the frustration that may result when a baby is difficult to soothe. We talked about times when we felt sad, mad or scared, and that these feelings are universal.

Theme three was "Caring and Planning for Baby." Most of our focus in this unit was around diapering a baby. We talked about making decisions about disposable vs cloth diapers based on comfort, cost and convenience. Mrs. Routledge's class learned how to change a baby and how to keep the baby safe while doing this. We observed baby Amelia's temperament while having her diaper changed, and enjoyed watching Amelia do her developmental exercises and play with our demonstration doll. The class was treated to many smiles and even some happy sounds from Baby Amelia. It is fun watching her grow and change each month!




GRADE FIVE NEWS by Mrs. Routledge



PROJECT 11



“Mental illness is increasingly threatening the lives of our children; with Canada’s youth suicide rate the third highest in the industrialized world” (Canadian Mental Health Association, 2014).

“Inspired and created in honor of Rick Rypien #11, former player of the Winnipeg Jets and Manitoba Moose, PROJECT 11 is a program to support students with virtual tutorials educating students of positive mental health. PROJECT 11 is an engaging cross-curricular prevention program targeting ELA and PE/Health outcomes. The program entails 15 lesson plans (1/week) and 60 daily activities to help support students and teachers on mental health wellness and bringing positive coping skills into their lives. PROJECT 11 uses concepts such as practicing focusing the mind, increasing self-awareness of feelings and strengths, and building positive relationships to help teach grade six students about stress, communication and self-reflection” (<http://www.projecteleven.ca/>).

Last September, Mrs. Facey sent in an application to be a part of a pilot group for Project 11. In February and June, her class completed surveys for the Project. This group of students was part of the control group to help the committee gather data about the success of their program. This September, Mrs. Facey went to Winnipeg to take the training for Project 11, as this year’s class was selected to be part of the second group to pilot the Project. The students have learned about healthy and unhealthy stress, the good and bad emotions that are connected with stress, and how to cope with stress. They are learning how to be resilient and are learning how to reflect on and talk about their stress. They have also enjoyed learning about making healthy snacks, learning dances, trying out some classroom yoga and learning relaxation techniques. The class is starting on their eighth lesson. They are continuing to learn a lot and are great participants.
